

Early check-in can also reduce the risk of being involuntarily bumped from an overbooked flight, as airlines typically give priority to those who checked in first.


SKIING INJURY

- On the Slopes

In many destinations. rideshare services offer a practical alternative to traditional taxis and public transport, providing door-todoortravelarrangedthrough a mobile app. However, local regulations, driver vetting practices, and crime trends can influence how safe and reliable they are. Learning how the service works at your location and applying targeted precautions can ensure a more secure journey.

Before Booking

Understand how rideshare services operate in your destination. Some cities require pickups in designated zones, while others restrict or ban rideshare vehicles entirely. Airports often have specific waiting areas for app-based services; knowing these in advance saves time and reduces the risk of getting into an unverified vehicle. If traveling

late at night, choose well-lit pickup areas with foot traffic or security presence.

Check whether tipping is customary, and be aware of surge pricing during peak periods, major events, or adverse weather. Use the app's fare estimate before confirming a ride so you



know what to expect. Always request rides through the official app, and decline offers from drivers who approach you directly, as such rides are unverified and may be unsafe.

Enable two-step verification on your rideshare account to prevent unauthorized

access. Keep your phone fully charged or carry a power bank so you can track your trip, use safety features, and contact help if needed. Review the driver's rating and recent passenger feedback, paying attention to comments about professionalism, route adherence, and vehicle condition.

Verifying Your Ride

Before entering a vehicle, confirm that the license plate, driver name, and car description match what appears in the app. If there is any mismatch, cancel the trip and request another. Avoid vehicles that already have passengers unless you booked a shared ride through the app.

Have your destination details ready. Store your hotel's business card or address in your phone for quick reference. Use the

app's trip-sharing feature so a trusted contact can follow your journey in real time and know your location and expected arrival time.

Managing Personal Information

Limit what you share with the driver. Avoid revealing your lodging name, travel itinerary, or whether you are traveling alone. If asked for your phone number, use inapp messaging rather than giving it directly. Refrain from posting your live location or ride details on social media, which could alert others to your movements.



During the Trip

Sit in the back seat to maintain personal space and allow an exit from either side. Keep bags, wallets, and electronics within reach rather than in the trunk, particularly in high-theft areas. Monitor your route using the in-app map or a separate navigation tool, and speak up if the driver takes an unfamiliar or significantly longer path

without explanation.


Keep doors locked and windows up in congested or high-risk areas to deter opportunistic theft. If the driver's speed or behavior makes you uncomfortable, request that they slow down or end the trip in a safe, public location.

If possible, travel with a companion, particularly late at night or in unfamiliar areas. Coordinate shared rides only with people you know and trust. When carrying large luggage, place it where you can see it whenever possible. If it must go in the trunk, ensure it is loaded securely before entering the vehicle.

If Things Go Wrong

If the driver deviates from the route and refuses to return to the correct path, stay calm but assertive. Use the app's "Contact Support" or "Emergency Assistance" feature immediately, and share your live location with a trusted contact. If necessary, ask to end the ride in a well-lit, populated area such as a hotel lobby or police station.

Keep local emergency numbers saved in your phone and written down in case of network or device failure. After the trip, report any unsafe conduct, overcharging, or other concerns through the rideshare app and, if warranted, to local authorities.



On Arrival

Verify that you have reached the correct location before exiting. Gather all belongings before stepping out, and only then complete payment and end the trip in the app. If paying cash, use small bills to avoid disputes. For card payments, keep your card in sight and ensure it is charged only once. Save receipts or trip records for reference if any issues arise later.

If the driver attempts to drop you short of your destination without a valid reason, insist on being taken to the agreed address, particularly in poorly lit or unfamiliar neighborhoods.

Always request rides through the official app, and decline offers from drivers who approach you directly.



SAFE SOCIAL MEDIA PRACTICES

WHILE TRAVELING

Social media allows travelers to share experiences instantly, but it also creates risks that extend beyond the screen. Criminals can exploit posts to identify empty homes, track movements, or collect personal information for scams. The FBI has cautioned that burglars monitor online activity to determine when households

are unoccupied. INTERPOL has also issued warnings that excessive online sharing can provide useful information to cybercriminals seeking to target travelers. These risks are increased abroad, where unfamiliar surroundings and reduced situational awareness make individuals increasingly vulnerable.



Understanding the Dangers

Posting travel updates while still at the location provides criminals with precise information about where you are and, equally important, where you are not. Photographs of hotel lobbies, boarding passes, or tourist attractions create a timeline of absence that offenders can use to plan a break-in at your residence. Repeated updates about daily activities can establish predictable patterns, such as preferred routes or meeting spots, which make it easier for someone to follow or target you. The most effective safeguard is to delay sharing until after leaving a location, or to wait until returning home to post a collection of highlights.

Safe Social Media Practices Abroad

Adjust privacy settings on all major platforms so posts are visible only to trusted contacts, and review older content for information that could be exploited, such as addresses, workplaces, or recurring routines. Disable location tagging, which can broadcast your exact position even when you do not explicitly mention it. Avoid posting photographs that reveal boarding passes, room numbers, or ID documents, as these frequently contain personal identifiers that can be misused for fraud.



In some destinations, posts that seem harmless at home may breach regulations or norms, particularly when they involve political commentary, government facilities, or images of police and security personnel. Access to platforms such as Facebook, X, or WhatsApp may also be blocked entirely, or activity may be closely monitored by authorities, with penalties for any attempts to bupass the restrictions using unauthorized tools. Several governments publish digital conduct guidance for travelers, and embassies or consulates often maintain updated advisories on both content rules and platform availability abroad.

Take steps to enable multifactor authentication on all major services and verify your account recovery information before you travel. Use strong and unique passwords for every account, and consider using a reputable password manager to avoid reusing credentials. Public Wi-Fi in airports, hotels, and cafes can expose your information to interception, so use a trusted virtual private network (VPN) to protect your data whenever possible. Note that that VPN use may be restricted or illegal in some countries;

always check local laws before connecting. Consider keeping separate accounts for public updates and reserving personal communications for private channels to limit the consequences if an account is ever compromised.

A family name mentioned in one post, a car license plate in another, and a public note about travel dates can all be combined for targeted scams or identity theft. Criminals increasingly use AI-generated content built from information found on social platforms to impersonate family members or friends. This can include fake social media profiles or cloned voices, enabling scammers to contact victims with convincing requests for money or personal information. These approaches make fraudulent communications more difficult to distinguish from genuine ones. If you receive messages that seem unusual, confirm the sender's identity through a different channel before responding.

Unusual account activity,

including any unexpected password reset requests, new login alerts from unfamiliar locations, or contacts reporting suspicious messages, are signs of potential compromise. Take immediate steps by resetting credentials, revoking access to unknown devices, and notifying contacts of the situation. Account recovery processes can be difficult to complete abroad due to connectivity or verification challenges, so preparation before departure is essential.

Post-Trip Digital Hygiene

Review the privacy settings on your social media accounts after returning to confirm that no location data or sensitive details were unintentionally shared during your trip. Remove or archive any posts that might disclose routines, travel companions, or family information that could be pieced together by others.

Monitor your bank statements and credit activity in the weeks following your return for any irregular transactions, as cybercriminals may exploit information collected while you were away. If you notice any unrecognized or suspicious charges, contact your financial institution immediately.
